

GUEST SPEAKER

Bob Diffenbaugh of Sport Flight, Inc. was our guest speaker for the month of March. The subject was "Meteorology For The Powered Ultralight". He covered cloud classification, frontal weather, pressure altitude, density altitude, convective, wind shear and aircraft generated turbulence and thermal soaring.

Since ultralight flight is strictly VFR (fair weather)flying it is essential that each ultralight pilot know the basics of weather--primarily in terms of winds and turbulence. Be prudent and recognize

your limitations:

A weather manual is available titled AVIATION WEATHER (ACOO-6A) \$8.25. The publication explains weather facts that every pilot should know.

To get a complete operational study you will also need a copy of Aviation Weather Services (AC 00-45). Both manuals may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C.

AWARDS

On Wednesday, 23d of March, Milton Brown of the National Aeronautic Association presented certificates of accomplishment for establishing new national non-stop "closed circuit" distance records for ultralights to Jerry Brown and John Hansen.

Both records will become official world records after the flight data are homologated by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale(FAI) in Paris, France.

The National Aeronautic Association certificates were presented at the National Air and Space Museum, Washington, D.C.
