The Privileged View Steve Beste, President

Almost heaven, West Virginia. Through friends at Front Royal, I heard about two lovely grass airfields near Charlestown, WV, that we're welcome to fly to. Neither one is on the charts, though I've marked them in red here.

Supposedly they're off the charts to keep student pilots from Martinsburg from practicing touch and goes there. Or so I was told. (Pete Bastien take note.) I flew up there at 6pm on a recent Saturday to check them out for you.

Cedar Meadows Airpark. This is the east-west field. It's an aviation community with 18 lots. The field is 3,000x100' in su-



perb condition. Elevation is 572'. Location: 39.243221, -77.990938. Their website says that they're planning to put it on the charts. That was in 2014, but I know from personal experience that putting an airfield on the charts can take years.

Summit Point Airport. The other field is just across the railway tracks to the north. It's much older and also not on the charts. The field is 1,800x70' in good condition. Elevation is 579'. Location: 39.247095, -77.987518. BTW, it's walking distance from the Summit Point motor raceway. Fly up to see the races!

Don't get too low over those railroad tracks on approach to runway 03. A train could come out of the trees and smack you. And look out for aircraft at Cedar Meadows. This could be complicated traffic.

I also explored River's Edge, 21 miles west, in the mountains. 39.3252778,-78.4255556, elevation 810'. Leonard McMaster lives at the field and welcomes everyone. Call first, though, to make sure

it's mowed. (304) 856-1118. He used to have a Maule that he campaigned all over West Virginia and across the country. He says he's been to every public airport in West Virginia and many of the private ones. (Too bad he didn't get a leather jacket out of it, but West Virginia has no such program.)

Anyway, at 1,800x50' the field is a little short for some people, with rising ground off either end. The day I visited, the winds aloft at 2,000' were 12mph from the east, making the approach a little bouncy but OK. You wouldn't want to go if they were much more, given the terrain.

So – there's no need to just keep going around the patch. Go explore these fields and meet some fellow flyers.





Quiz Time By Steve Beste

You can't really call a 2,000' runway with a control tower a "secret airfield". All the same, it's not on the charts.

The Control Tower

I hear that the private owner rents it out to the government for practicing nighttime High-Altitude Low-Opening (HALO) parachute drops. Hence the name on the control tower: LZ Black Horse (for landing zone) and the lights on the runway. I flew out there to check it out and take these pictures. You can see it from miles away because it's on a ridge top. The ridge, in turn, is just east of a much bigger ridge. The ridges made a fair amount of mechanical turbulence even on the low-wind day that I went. It was calm on the ground but with a 10mph flow from the west at altitude. If that flow were 20mph, I wouldn't attempt a landing even if it were calm on the field. I can only imagine what it must be like to do a HALO drop at night under those conditions.




Looking up the 2,000' ridge-top runway


Your challenge: send me the coordinates of the field. It's in West Virginia between Route 50 on the north and the multiple power lines that cross the state further south. It's between the Cacapon River on the east and the South Fork of the Potomac on the west. Notice the shadows in the pictures. I took them at noon. LZ Black Horse: Be glad you're not trying to find it at night while hanging from a parachute.
