The Privileged View Steve Beste, President

Sean Roe finds a hangar near home. With a great deal of luck – and a little help from friends – Sean Roe is about to move his Challenger II into a hangar at the Front Royal airport.

You all know how scarce hangars are here in Northern Virginia. All the airports have waiting lists that are years long. So when Sean showed up three years ago with his Challenger, he was grateful that Tom Richards found room for him at the Airpark. But Sean lives in Front Royal, so he put himself on the waiting list there.

Meanwhile, I knew that David Humm was selling his trike, which was in the hangar behind mine at Front Royal. You may have noticed his ad for it in the newsletter for months. Last month it suddenly sold – to a fellow in Ohio, so I knew the hangar would be coming free.



Now, the allocation of hangars at an airport is at the discretion of the airport manager. Yes, there's a waiting list. But the manager has other interests he also has to consider. In this case, manager Rock Skowbo had two:

- He didn't want to kick anybody out. The hangar was shared with a gyroplane (see the picture), so having a new tenant whose plane could share the hangar was a plus. Sean's Challenger fits just fine.
- He wanted an active flyer. Rock is promoting the airport to the county board that owns it. He wants to show activity. I hear that one of the hangars at Front Royal houses a pilot's collection of dead and dying motorcycles. No more of that, please! And no hangar queens, either. It was in Sean's favor that he lives in Front Royal and so is likely to fly more frequently than someone who lives far away.

I imagine it also helped that Sean was actually on the waiting list and had been there for a long time.

At any rate, Sean and David got together, along with John Franklin who owns the gyroplane. They presented Rock with a proposal that met all his concerns, and Sean now has a hangar lease with the county. I couldn't be happier. And I get Sean as a new neighbor and flying buddy.

John Franklin and his gyroplane. Good for Sean, but what's the story with that gyroplane? It's John Franklin's project of many years. I met John in 2011 when Tom Simmons invited Andreas Weiss (the German diplomat and original owner of that blue trike) and me to come land at "Franklin International", a 900' field next to John's house in Purcellville. (See the field on the club website. Click through to the pictures.) The three of us gave rides to his friends one evening and we all got to know him.

About that time, John had begun work on this gyroplane, building it from a kit. He also began work on his gyroplane pilot's license, studying under Chris Burgess at the Frederick airport. The gyro was substantially done by 2013, and John moved it to this hangar for flight testing. However, it has never flown. After taxiing it, Chris Burgess declared that the suspension was too springy, making the gyro unstable. Then, the manufacturer of the gyro died and Chris retired to Florida, leaving John on his own with what he'd been told was an unsafe design. And he still does not have a license to fly it.

John well knows our other local gyro pilots – club members **Kurt Mohr**, **Mike Vadney**, and instructor **Frank Noe**. As the years have gone by, they've been urging him to do something with the project. He's now found an outfit that makes custom gyroplane parts and has a design for a more conventional landing gear. Wish him well. In the meantime, John is as happy as Sean is to be still in that hangar.

As for David Humm, he has an airplane license from his native New Zealand and took trike lessons here with Ron Dixon. He soloed, practiced, and came right up to the point of taking his examination. But he spends most of the flying season out of state and realized that he was never going to use the trike as he had once imagined. So he sold up. I'm sorry to lose him.

Larry Tristan Walker, Sr. 1937-2021

Larry passed away April 25, 2021 in his home in Ogden, Utah with his family by his side. Born in Statesboro, Georgia, Larry was an Army career officer whose 23 years of service included two tours in Vietnam. His many awards included the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal and the Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross. While posted to Ft. Leavenworth, he attended and taught at the Army Command and General Staff College, and then headed up CECOM SDSC. He retired from the Signals Warfare Lab at Vint Hill Farms Station, Virginia.

Larry was always interested in radios and communications and became the youngest ham radio operator in Georgia (call sign K4LLQ). He was a member and past president of the Fauquier



Amateur Radio Association and a 58-year member of the Military Auxiliary Radio Systems (MARS). He was also a General Aviation Pilot and past president of Flying Club 1 (at 7VG0).



FAA WINGS Pilot Proficiency Program Overview & How To Get Started

You have heard of the WINGS program. Here is why you should sign up if you have a pilot's license.

Background

The FAA's Pilot Proficiency Award Program (WINGS) promotes air safety and encourages general aviation pilots to continue training and maintain proficiency. The goal is to prevent aircraft accidents. The program features two aspects, knowledge, and flight. The knowledge portion presents online courses to maintain or increase an airman's knowledge. The courses are at a quality level found in college, air carrier or military education presentations. Most of these courses are free of charge. The flight portion provides an opportunity to practice and perform selected maneuvers to the standards found in the FAA Airman Certification Standards (ACS) or Practical Test Standards (PTS) for the certificate level you choose.

All pilots holding a U.S. pilot certificate may participate in the WINGS Program. To participate in the flight portions of the program, pilots should contact a certificated flight instructor who will evaluate and validate the flight portions of the WINGS requirements.

Student pilots are encouraged to participate in the WINGS Program. Note that student pilots will initially register on FAASafety.gov as a non-airman.

Benefits of Participation

Did you know that one of the things an FAA or NTSB investigator does when investigating a general aviation accident or incident is look at a pilot's record with the FAA's WINGS Pilot Proficiency Program?

It's true, said Jim Alexander, an FAA Safety Team Representative and WINGSPro with the Washington FSDO, during a webinar on the program.

"I have heard of FAA inspectors who when they hear of a general aviation mishap, one of the first things they do is check the WINGS records of the mishap pilots," he said. "If they find no WINGS record, that sends a message. If they find a strong WINGS record that also sends a message that you're demonstrating a commitment to safety."

The WINGS Pilot Proficiency Program was created in 1996 with the goal in of increasing general aviation safety by addressing the primary factors that cause general aviation accidents.

Also, many insurance underwriters look favorably on WINGS participation and will discount their rates. My insurance agent encourages me to send her my WINGS certificates and she sends them to the underwriters at renewal time.

Completing a WINGS *phase* – a collection of courses and activities, counts as a flight review. By completing a phase, a pilot will not have to complete a flight review in the following 24 calendar months.

And most importantly, participation in the WINGS program will make you a better, safer pilot!

What You Have to Do

To complete a *phase* of WINGS you must complete 3 Knowledge Courses and 3 Flight Activities within one year. A Knowledge Course might be "Aeronautical Decision Making for VFR Pilots." A typical Flight Activity would be "ASEL – Slow Flight, Stall, Slips, Emergency Landings."

How to Get Started

The first thing to do is create an account on the FAA Safety Team home page www.faasafety.gov if you do not already have one. Click on either login or on the "Create an Account" link. Once logged on, click on the "My Preferences Profile" link.





On the preference page you will be presented with eight tabs. It is a good idea to look at all of them. The following is a short discussion of some of the more important items found in these tabs.

General Tab: This tab controls what email notifications you receive. Quite often, if you enroll in courses that you find interesting when you receive an email notification, you will find that you always have all

the knowledge courses required for the current WINGS level you are working on. Courses and Webinar credits expire after a year and if you have a qualifying unapplied course the system will automatically replace the newly expired course with it.

WINGS Profile Tab: The entries you make on this tab are extremely helpful in limiting the activities displayed in your Knowledge & Flight categories to just those that are of interest to you.



WINGS Topics

To complete a Phase of WINGS you must complete 3 Knowledge Activities and 3 Flight Activities within one year. You access your WINGS Activities from the home page:




Quick WINGS provides a quick and easy way for pilots to view and print a checklist of Activities for a Basic Phase of WINGS. The checklist will include a complete listing of activities and tasks to complete the Flight requirements, and may include online courses, seminars, and other activities to satisfy the three knowledge requirements.

The Advanced and Master levels for airplanes are based on the ACS Standards for Commercial and ATP while the Basic level is based on the ACS PPT (also suitable for Recreational and Sport). There is no limit to how many Phases you can earn in any level.

My WINGS

MyWINGS is where you can pick and choose which Activities you want as your Knowledge and Flight requirements for your current Phase of WINGS.



Rewards

After completing Phase 1 of each level (Basic, Advanced or Master), you can claim a WINGS pin. When you are eligible for the pin, click the Claim Reward button on the My WINGS page.

The \$10,000 WINGS Sweepstakes is sponsored by the WINGS Industry Network and funded by Fran and Paul Burger, a pilot and longtime advocate for general aviation who believes that WINGS saves lives.

Any time you complete a WINGS phase, you are eligible for an entry into the annual contest. The



more phases you complete, the better your chances to win part of the prize money. Four \$1,500 winners, four \$750 winners, and two \$500 winners are chosen every year.

It is easy to enter. Go to your My WINGS page on FAASafety.gov, click on Claim Reward on the lower right side of the screen, and select the WINGS Sweepstakes.
