The Privileged View Steve Beste, President

What shall we do with your body once you're gone? Do you want to be buried in a cemetery? One where you have already purchased a plot "pre-need" as the cemetery people say? If so, your family can drive their "pre-owned" car

to your "pre-need" plot. So many euphemisms! My mother scoffed at euphemisms. She had many strong opinions and was happy to let you know what they were – no euphemisms needed, thank you very much. When it came to cemeteries, she had this opinion: she thought they were "an unconscionable levy of the dead upon the living. And waste of perfectly good real estate." Needless to say, we had her cremated.

But what then to do with the "cremains"? There's a story about this from before my time at the Aerodrome. There was a pilot George (?), who had had many happy hours flying from the field. When he died, his wife asked if she could hold the funeral there with his ashes scattered on the runway from someone's aircraft. Why yes, of course. In fact, one of his friends had a helicopter, which would make the scattering slow and precise. So it was that after the ceremony, the pilot and a friend took off with George's ashes. As they passed low over the field, the friend reached out and dumped the ashes reverently. Whoosh! The ashes did not fall! Instead, the rotor wash blew them back into the cabin of the helicopter. The inside was a mess, covered in George. Of course, the aviators never told the widow. But it made for a macabre cleanup job, and I imagine there's still a bit of him in that chopper.



I told that story years ago to my trike instructor, Ron Dixon. So

he had it very much in mind when he was approached with the same request awhile back. A pilot had died. His widow wanted his ashes strewn on a grass airfield. Would Ron do it from his trike? Why yes, of course. But Ron likes things clean and tidy. He imagined himself cleaning ashes out of his trike. That was never going to do.

So he built the device you see here.



The cremains go in the tank, which has a stopper at its bottom that can be pulled out by the wire that you see. Air flowing through the long tube will then suck the ashes out of the tank and blow them out the back, clear of the propeller. At least that was the concept. As with any design of something new, you should expect problems. I don't know whether or not Ron tested this thing before the big day. Probably not, since where are you going to get a bag of test cremains?

The first problem he ran into was that "George" wouldn't fit in the tank. Maybe he'd been a really big guy. So there may have been some left over. Ron didn't tell me what became of that surplus. Then, once aloft, Ron found that the stopper was really hard to pull out. It turns out that cremains are *heavy*. So he was still tugging on the cord when he reached the drop point. Fortunately, the field was long enough that he got the stopper out while still over the field. The cremains flew out the back like smoke from an airshow plane. He reports that they were quite visible to the people on the ground. Mission accomplished.

I tell you all this because evidently strewing ashes over airfields is a thing. Perhaps a thing you have in mind for yourself? If so, get in touch with Ron. I'm sure he'll be happy to loan you his device. He might even loan it to you "pre-need".






